Penelope of the Year Award



The Penelope of the Year program of the Daughters of Penelope was instituted in 1958. Through this program members at the Supreme Convention each year, select a recipient who is recognized as an outstanding Daughter of Penelope, who excels in contributions and service to the Daughters of Penelope throughout her many years of service, as well as having participated significantly in the Greek Community, to civic and charitable organizations, to various civic endeavors, and has served and provided unselfish assistance to the Daughters of Penelope and her community.

Annually, each chapter has the opportunity to nominate and submit a completed application of one of their members to their District Convention. A pin is presented to recognize the District Penelope of the Year in recognition of this achievement. The application of each District's Penelope of the Year is then submitted to the Supreme Convention Penelope of the Year Committee Chairman for consideration. At the Supreme Convention delegates serving on the Penelope of the Year Committee select the Sister who is recognized as the International Penelope of the Year. Her example of outstanding and distinguished service serves as an inspiration to all Sisters throughout the Daughters of Penelope domain.

Salute to Women

The Salute to Women was founded by Past Grand President Honorable Betty Athanasakos and Past Grand President Joanna Panagopoulos Merakos. The idea was conceived in 1965 to promote the Daughters of Penelope as a major National and International Woman's Philanthropic Organization.

Since the Daughters of Penelope had proven to be a dynamic force in their local communities and was making a stir throughout the U.S., Canada, and Greece, Past Grand President Athanasakos recommended the Daughters of Penelope recognize an outstanding woman outside of the organization. Four years later, Grand President Merakos adopted the idea to honor a woman who represented and possessed the goals and ideals of the Daughters of Penelope and the "SALUTE" became a reality.

The first Salute to Women event was held at the Sheraton Park Hotel in Washington, DC. The Salute to Women is awarded biennially and is presented at a reception held during the AHEPA Family Supreme Convention.

Thank you all for bringing in new members, nurturing them, including them and making them feel the embrace of our Sisterhood.

Initiatives

This year the Grand Lodge of the Daughters of Penelope put forth various initiatives to advance our Sisterhood. The intent was to capture and strengthen the enthusiasm of the membership. Below is a summary of these initiatives:

Oral History Project

The Oral History project was introduced to the District Governors during the Leadership Seminar in September and was subsequently launched to the Sisterhood. Over 750 Sisters shared their memories of being part of the Daughters of Penelope! Thank you to Executive Director, Elena Saviolakis, for bringing this opportunity to our attention and working with the company to bring this project to fruition. Publication of the book "In Our Words" is scheduled for the fall. This will certainly be a beautiful celebration of our Sisterhood and "The Power of WE."

Charity Walk- The Power of WE Moving Forward Together

We encouraged the Sisterhood to participate in a walk for Charity during the month of November. The monies raised was to be applied to charitable donations. The hosting chapter or district retained 75% of the monies that were to be donated to local charities. This was intended to help

each chapter/district promote the Daughters of Penelope and strengthen our name recognition at the local level. Twenty-five percent of the monies raised was to be sent to our National Charitable Foundation at Headquarters. It is our hope that through the cumulative contributions to the Charitable Foundation we will be able to expand our philanthropic donations in the future. Ten chapters, the European Chapters and two Districts participated in this initiative. As a result, the Daughters of Penelope Charitable Foundation received over \$2,000. It is projected that over \$6,000 was donated to local charities throughout the domain. Bravo Sisters. I know that those that participated really enjoyed themselves! Power of WE-Celebrating Women

This year every effort was made to put the slogan "The Power of WE" (Women's Empowerment) into action. Those events included:

A Tribute to Greek American Women" panel discussion and reception co-hosted by the Embassy of Greece and the Daughters of Penelope

Although originally scheduled to take place last year, the Daughters were able to bring the collaboration between our organization and the Embassy of Greece in Washington DC to reality on November 3, 2022. A very special thank you is extended to our Executive Director, Elena Saviolakis, who worked on this event for over a year! The fruits of her labor resulted in an extraordinary celebration of Women.

Spirit of Penelope Award

When an organization has awards that are used to expand its visibility to the greater community the mission of the organization is elevated. When given to accomplished individuals, it is a vehicle to develop relationships and expand the organization's presence in society. With that in mind, the Grand Lodge created the "Spirit of Penelope" award. It is our hope, as it is given over time, and when given to worthy recipients, that its significance strengthens the presence of our dynamic women's organization, The Daughters of Penelope. The criterion of the award is as follows:



This award is given to a woman who exemplifies dignity, perseverance, and creativity. She has achieved a level of personal success and continues to move forward professionally. Through her example, she inspires and empowers women.

Zone Conferences

The Grand Lodge planned to host two Zone Conferences this year, but time escaped us. We were able to gather in Waterbury Connecticut in March for the Zone I conference this year. Over 100 Sisters from Districts 3-9 gathered to share ideas and celebrate Sisterhood. Thank you to Grand

Power of WE Mail Campaign

One never knows where your inspiration is going to come from! As I was sitting across from my mother one day watching her go through her mail and seeing all of the donation solicitations that she was writing checks for it came to me... Why isn't she getting a letter from the Daughters? Who else is out there who would like to send a donation? Who feels that they can't be present or physically attend their chapter meetings but would send in a contribution to show their support? And so, the "Power of WE" Mail campaign was created. I would like to thank all of the Sisters and supporters of the Daughters of Penelope who honored a special woman by contributing to the campaign. The Daughter's realized over \$8,000 (after the expenses for the mailing are deducted) from the generosity of about 120 participants. Financial Growth

In order for our organization to move forward, expand our footprint and strengthen our impact on society we must strengthen our financial positioning. Financial security encourages the expansion of initiatives and provides for the resources to secure and promote programs. It is the membership that sustains an organization. With that said, it is the organization that must prove that it is worthy of that support by providing resources, sponsoring programs and remaining transparent with respect to finances.



Headquarters continues to provide our available resources, professional knowledge, and skills to our elected officers so they can execute their duties to the best of their abilities. Headquarters plays a pivotal role in conjunction with the Grand Lodge to manage expenses and promote the goals and mission of the Order.

Headquarters continues to establish our own presence on Capitol Hill as the Daughters of Penelope and increase our legislative efforts thereby fulfilling our civic duty. The Grand President and Grand Lodge meets with members of the Congressional Caucus throughout the year on Hellenic Issues to update them on the community service provided by DOP chapters at home and abroad. Furthermore, Headquarters and the Grand Lodge encourage DOP members to outreach to their legislators to grow the Victims' Rights Caucus and the Hellenic Caucus, and ensure the DOP's voice is heard to back funding for the Crime Victims Fund, which is crucial to domestic violence programs nationwide.

Headquarters also generates exposure via several social media outlets including Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram in addition to newspapers including The National Herald and Hellenic News of America.

Thank you to the staff at AHEPA Headquarters (Basil, Rory, Rosalind, Sam, Elliot and Stephanie), for all they do. Thank you to my Grand Lodge Sisters, DOP Legislative Consultant Andrew Kaffes, and of course all the Sisters in our Order for the support, comradery, and hard work to promote the Daughters of Penelope. Thank you also to the AHEPA Supreme Lodge, Board of Trustees, and Board of Auditors for their continued support and generous donations towards our programs.

DOP MEMBERSHIP SYSTEM

- The guide and link to the membership portal is on our website under the Members tab. If you need help or have any questions regarding the system, please do not hesitate to contact me at elena@ahepa.org. Chapters who do not wish to use the membership system can continue to send in the chapter's remittance form and check. Membership cards however are only available online.
- The top four chapter officers have the ability to pay for the chapter members. The top four chapter officers also have access to their chapter reports and the top four district officers have access to the chapter reports within their district. To view a live walk through of how to use the membership system as a Chapter Officer, please visit the Members tab of our website.
- Members who wish to pay back dues for years missed must send their payment through

their chapter via check as done previously. New members must send their payment and membership application through their chapter as well via check as done previously.

PER CAPITA

It is important to note that when it comes to our budget, per capita is the main source of funding that helps the Daughters of Penelope appropriately function as an international women's organization. Your support is greatly appreciated!

IRS FILING NEWS

What is an EIN? An Employer Identification Number (EIN) is also known as a Federal Tax Identification Number, and is used to identify your chapter. Each chapter and district of the Daughters of Penelope must have their own EIN and must update their bank accounts with their EIN.

501(c)10 Chapter and District E-Postcards:

In 2008, DOP Headquarters notified each chapter that a new IRS procedure was in effect. This procedure mandated that every chapter with gross receipts less than \$50,000 under the AHEPA tax exempt umbrella needed to file an annual online e-postcard or IRS Form 990-N (Chapters and Districts must have an EIN to file an e-postcard). This filing is due by the 15th day of the 5th month after the end of the chapter's tax year.

In order to eliminate the risk of our chapters losing their tax-exempt status, **Daughters of Penelope Headquarters files an e-postcard for each Chapter and District in the Daughters of Penelope**. Chapters and district can view copies of their filed 990n's via the IRS website at www.irs.gov. Chapters with gross receipts over \$50,000 in any tax year must seek professional tax advice in their local jurisdictions and notify HQ.

DOP CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

At the 2011 District Governor's Seminar and the 2012 Supreme Convention, AHEPA Family Headquarters announced the possibility of Headquarters and all the chapters and districts obtaining 501c3 group exemption status via the IRS. To do so, AHEPA & DOP Headquarters issued 501c3 EINs via the IRS under the AHEPA Family umbrella (over 750 EINs total) for the IRS to review.

After a thorough three-year review, the IRS denied the group exemption stating there was not sufficient control over the activity of all the chapters and districts. As a result, the IRS informed Headquarters that 501c3 status would need to be individually applied for via the IRS guidelines. This result was announced at the 2014 Supreme Convention and the 2014 District Governor's Seminar. Therefore, the appropriate paperwork was submitted to the IRS to obtain 501c3 status to the Daughters of Penelope Charitable Foundation, Inc. which was granted in October 2014.

This 501c3 status has been set up under the AHEPA Family umbrella for charitable purposes and special projects (such as the Grand President's project which began in October 2014 – Saint Nicholas National Shrine) and primarily serves disaster relief efforts. The 501c3 EIN is now

associated with Headquarters' charitable bank account making charitable efforts official with the IRS and allows Headquarters the capability to issue tax donation letters to individuals contributing to Headquarters' disaster relief efforts. In addition, this 501c3 status gives Headquarters the capability to receive specific charitable grants, tax exempt on charitable events and fundraisers, and tax exempt on mailings and material for charitable purposes.

The purpose of the DOP Charitable Foundation is to help fulfill the philanthropic portion of the DOP mission and serve the community by making donations to worthy causes and endeavors. Donations are accepted by visiting the DOP Donation page located on the DOP website Note: 100% of the donations given for a charity to the Charitable Foundation go to the charity. Headquarters absorbs all expenses to ensure 100% is donated. This year the Daughters of Penelope received a \$3,000 grant earmarked for Meals on Wheels from AHEPA Housing. Thank you to AHEPA Housing for recognizing our philanthropic efforts for such a worthy cause. Your support is greatly appreciated.

This Foundation's Board is the Grand Lodge as the Grand Lodge oversees all Headquarters bank accounts. This foundation is not to be associated with National Projects as it serves projects outside the scope of those projects voted at the Supreme Convention annually. This foundation is part of the IRS AHEPA Family umbrella and therefore is included in the AHEPA Family audit each year.

Note: The above foundation is not to be confused with the DOP Foundation, Inc., which is a separate entity. The Daughters of Penelope Foundation, Inc. programs include scholarship acquisition, maintenance and distribution, literacy programs, promotion of Hellenic art and history, and educational workshops. The Foundation sponsors a national symposium biennially which promotes prominent authors, sociologists, musicians, and historians.

The Daughters of Penelope Headquarters supports the DOP Foundation, Inc. as all DOP chapters donate to it as a project and towards their Scholarship Fund. These funds are handled and audited by Daughters of Penelope Headquarters and transferred to the DOP Foundation, Inc. at the Supreme Convention. Fifteen percent is deducted from the funds collected to help offset the cost of the external audit conducted annually for the AHEPA combined financial statements which include the Daughters of Penelope.

GRAND PRESIDENT GEORGETTE BOULEGERIS



Under the leadership of Grand President Georgette Boulegeris, the Daughters of Penelope had a very productive year and attained a great number of membership goals and mission moments.

Grand President Georgette traveled to Chapter and District workshops, conferences and conventions throughout our domain as well as events to create outside exposure for the Daughters of Penelope. She also raised awareness about the charitable work and mission of the Daughters of Penelope to our membership and peripheral organizations through monthly enewsletters, action alerts, and social media.

Our membership statistics show an increase

in reinstatements and initiations, and we will continue to grow. This year, alone, several chapters were chartered and reinstated in the US, and Greece, cementing the DOP's true international presence.

In October the Grand President participated in Ideagen's Global Summit via the educational panel which took place at the United Nations Headquarters in New York. Ideagen's Annual Global Leadership Summit is committed to finding systemic solutions via catalytic impact to solve the world's most vexing issues. It was an honor for the Daughters of Penelope to participate.

In November I accompanied the Grand President to Paris, France where we held the annual DOP Europe Conference. Sisters from all over Europe joined the conference to learn more about the Daughters of Penelope, how to grow membership, and how to engage in local and national projects. In April I accompanied the Grand President to Greece where we visited with numerous government officials to discuss issues of mutual interests affecting the community as we do annually. We held the annual DOP Greece Conference in Hraklion, Crete this year. Our conferences abroad serve as an opportunity for the Chapters within Greece and Europe to not only meet with the Grand President and Grand Lodge but also to come together and exchange ideas, goals, and other pertinent topics in an open forum. The Grand President was also able to initiate several Sisters into the Order.

Grand President Georgette ensured the Daughters of Penelope maintained its strong voice in Washington, DC. In particular, she shined during the return of our Capitol Hill Day, which occurred June 15. Grand President Georgette met with her U.S. representative, Tom Kean, Jr., who is serving his first term, and attended several other meetings with congressional offices. She also interfaced with several key members of the Congressional Caucus on Hellenic Issues in

addition to Ranking Member of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs Gregory Meeks. Further, on the eve of Capitol Hill Day, Grand President Georgette represented the DOP at a reception held on the occasion of the "Global Chiefs of Mission" conference where she renewed relationships with U.S. Ambassadors George Tsunis and Julie Fisher as well as to interface with her U.S. senator, Robert Menendez, who chairs the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations and New Jersey Congressman Donald Payne, Jr.

On the policy front, the DOP continues to contribute to successful efforts to strengthen federal investment in victims' services programs authorized by the Violence Against Women Act and Victims of Crime Act as Grand President Georgette submitted written testimony to House and Senate appropriators. The DOP also lent its voice to support another life-saving program for survivors of domestic violence and their families -- the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act in an effort to get the Senate to consider it before the end of the 117th Congress. All these programs provide federal grants to entities such as Penelope House and Penelope's Place and support the National Domestic Violence Hotline. Finally, the Daughters of Penelope joined with other Hellenic organizations to back congressional support for meaningful federal investment in the U.S.-Greece relationship and always looked for ways to convey support for food nutrition programs for older adults, such as Meals on Wheels.

I extend my sincere gratitude and appreciation for the guidance, mentorship, and professional courtesies afforded me under Grand President Georgette's leadership. I admire her for the energy she invested throughout the year in promoting the Goals of the Order and thankful for a successful and productive year.

• It is my goal For the Daughters of Penelope's Civic Responsibility campaign to be a value-add for DOP membership.



Legislation Updates

The Grand President and Executive Director are kept apprised of policy matters that fall under the scope of its mission and service programs or policy initiatives that are of interest to the relevant congressional caucuses. This would include monitoring legislation that is important, reporting on the status of federal funding for certain programs of interest to the Daughters of Penelope, or advising when developments occur within these caucuses.

As this report covers the 2022-23 DOP administrative year, a legislative loose end from the 117th Congress, which concluded its session in late December 2022.

118th Congress

With the 118th Congress starting anew, legislation of interest to Daughters of Penelope members has been reintroduced. Below is an update.

U.S. Senate

• The Senate **passed** the resolution by unanimous consent in May 2023.



If helping domestic violence survivors is a policy interest, U.S. representatives introduced legislation to reauthorize critical federal programs that provide assistance to the agencies and providers of lifesaving services to those victims.

Legislation: A bill to amend the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) to make improvements.

- ➤ House Bill Number: H.R.2604 | Co-Sponsors: 38
- ➤ Background: FVPSA a lifeline for survivors of domestic violence. It supports lifesaving services including: emergency shelters, legal assistance, crisis hotlines, counseling, and programs for underserved communities throughout the United States. FVPSA is the only federal funding source dedicated to domestic violence shelters, including **Penelope House**, supporting almost 1,600 community-based programs through state formula grants. FVPSA also provides funding for the on-going operation of a 24-hour, national, toll-free National Domestic Violence Hotline.

Note: In the 117th Congress, the House passed the bill in October 2021, but the Senate did not take action.

DOP Fights for VOCA, VAWA Investment

The Daughters of Penelope continues to contribute to successful efforts to strengthen federal investment in victims' services programs authorized by the Violence Against Women Act and Victims of Crime Act.

For fiscal year 2024, DOP Grand President Georgette Boulegeris submitted outside witness written testimony to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, and Science (CJS) and to the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on CJS in April and May 2023. The written testimony was on the topic of "FY24 Funding: VAWA, VOCA Programs & Crime Victims Fund." It highlighted the

importance of VOCA and VAWA grants to DOP-sponsored and locally supported domestic violence shelters because of the victims' services the grants allow the shelters to provide. For example, historically, VOCA and VAWA grants have funded more than 37% of **Penelope House's** budget.

- VOCA supports the salaries and benefits for seven Court/Victim Advocates, and VAWA supports
 a full-time Court Advocate Administrative Assistant and a portion of the salary for a
 Court/Victim Advocate for the Court Advocacy Program at Penelope House.
- Moreover, at Penelope's Place, VOCA funding supports a rape crisis center and domestic violence support programs including "SAFEPLAN" court advocacy that aids residents with restraining and harassment orders.

<u>FY2023 recap</u>: Congress provided **\$709 million** for the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) grant programs, **\$227.5 million** for Family Violence Prevention and Services Act (FVPSA) programs, including **\$20.5 million** for the Domestic Violence Hotline – all of which were above FY2022 funding levels. The Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Crime Victims' Fund had a **\$1.9 billion** cap (non-taxpayer funded; money is derived by fines paid by offenders convicted of Federal crimes).

HUD Section 202 Housing for the Elderly

For DOP chapters that are sponsors of HUD Section 202 affordable elderly housing, or that are interested in the 202 program, it continues to do quite well from a federal investment standpoint after five fiscal years in the mid-2010s of no investment in new construction.

<u>FY2023 recap</u>: Congress provided a historic mark of **\$1.075 billion** for the 202 program that included **\$110 million** for the construction of new units, and **\$125 million** for grant renewals for service coordinators, who are the linchpin of the 202 program as we saw during the pandemic, especially with the service coordinators' organization of on-site vaccination clinics.

In late 2022, HUD announced a new round of funding availability for new construction and an AHEPA application from Albuquerque was submitted in early 2023. An award announcement is expected by early fall. This comes on the heels of two successful awards for new construction for Des Moines and South Bend were announced in September 2021. There is also hope for a new round of funding before the end of 2023.

U.S.-Greece Relations

The Daughters of Penelope supported a bipartisan "Dear Colleague" letter, spearheaded by Hellenic Caucus members, including Co-Chairs U.S. Reps. Chris Pappas and Gus Bilirakis, that urged House appropriators to provide meaningful federal investment in the U.S.-Greece relationship as well as U.S. engagement in the eastern Mediterranean framework of relations between Greece, Cyprus, and Israel.

FY2024 Outlook

The debt ceiling agreement capped FY24 domestic spending at roughly FY23 levels and allows a 1% growth in FY25. Despite the agreement, House and Senate appropriators remain far apart on FY24 allocation levels. Congress must pass all 12 appropriations bills by the end of the fiscal year, which is September 30. The prospect for a government shutdown to occur this year, given the significant gap between the House and Senate allocations levels, is real.



Capitol Hill Day

Capitol Hill Day returned in earnest on June 15, 2023!

Led by Grand President Georgette Boulegeris, Daughters of Penelope members contributed to the day's success, participating in meetings with members of Congress and their staffs. Thanks to the DOP's reach, which literally spanned from coast to coast, we were able to touch well over 40 congressional offices.

Moreover, the morning "training" session featured man Hellenic Caucus members stopping by: Co-chairs Gus Bilirakis (FL) and Chris Pappas (NH), Vice-chairs Dina Titus (NV) and Nicole Malliotakis (NY); and members John Sarbanes (MD) and Grace Meng (NY).

A favorite highlight also returned—the taking of the group photo on the steps of the U.S. Capitol! This year, we were joined by six U.S. representatives in the photo!

Participants also attended a reception held the evening prior, June 14. U.S. Ambassadors George Tsunis and Julie Fisher as well as Senate Foreign Relations Committee Chairman Robert Menendez of New Jersey and Congressman Donald Payne of New Jersey, provided remarks.







Additional Outreach

In September 2022, DOP Executive Director Elena Saviolakis joined AHEPA Executive Director Basil Mossaidis to meet with Hellenic Caucus members prior to the conclusion of the 117th Congress to thank them for their efforts during the Congress. Most importantly, they conveyed the community's sincere appreciation to Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney for her decades of passionate leadership of the Hellenic Caucus, which she co-founded. The DOP added special thanks for her being a champion of VAWA and all federal programs that provide crucial services to survivors of domestic violence and their families. Maloney lost a primary race to retain her seat.

Assessing the Congressional Caucuses

Increasing the membership of the congressional caucuses that help to augment the DOP's voice on Capitol Hill is always in our interest and our challenge. In this endeavor, the DOP's Civic Responsibility Campaign continues to make efforts to grow the Congressional Hellenic Caucus and the Congressional Crime Solvers and Justice Caucus.

Congressional Caucus on Hellenic Issues

The Congressional Caucus on Hellenic Issues is under new leadership for the 118th Congress. We will miss former co-chair Congresswoman Carolyn Maloney, who also was a co-founder.

The Daughters of Penelope congratulates the newly established leadership of the Caucus, U.S. Reps. Gus M. Bilirakis (R-FL) and Chris Pappas (D-NH), who are serving as co-chairs. The DOP also conveyed its excitement to see the Caucus establish vice chair positions, U.S. Reps. Dina Titus (D-NV) and Nicole Malliotakis (R-NY), passionate and effective women legislators who serve in that role.

Caucus growth is slowly increasing after the caucus suffered attrition following the November 2022 election that saw its membership fall to 87. The need to grow the caucus is real.

• There are **95** members of the Hellenic Caucus.

Congressional Crime Solvers and Justice Caucus

The Victims' Rights Caucus has been renamed to the Congressional Crime Solvers and Justice Caucus. Although the caucus was rebranded, it suffered some inactivity in the 117th Congress. However, in the 118th Congress, it seems to be revitalized with a new Republican co-chair, Congressman Anthony D'Esposito of New York, to work alongside caucus co-founder and co-chair, Congressman Jim Costa of California. The caucus also has a new website and membership stands at 45.

A priority will be to reengage with the caucus during this Congress.

Grassroots Development/Action Alerts

An integral part of the "Civic Responsibility" Campaign strategy is to identify Daughters of Penelope members who are willing to be a part of a grassroots network. "Action Alerts" go hand-in-hand with the grassroots network. These alerts help keep DOP members updated on the goings-on in Washington that relate to DOP policy interests.

Action Alerts

Action alerts were issued in October in support of Domestic Violence

Awareness Month and to raise awareness of certain pieces of legislation and periodically to help grow the Hellenic Caucus.



Outreach/Partnership Initiatives

Meals on Wheels America

It is always important to identify opportunities to create relationships or establish partnerships, especially when a natural opportunity exists. It is wonderful to see the relationship between the Daughters of Penelope flourish with the executive leadership of Meals on Wheels of America, including its CEO, Ellie Hollander.

National Chair Report Penelope House - Kathy Matrakas, PGG



I am humbled and honored to have served as the National DOP Chair for Penelope House (PH) Family Violence Center in Mobile, AL. As one of our National Projects, Penelope House has served the Mobile, Washington, Choctaw, and Clarke Counties in Alabama for almost 44 years. Cofounded by Ambassador/Sister Dr. Kathryn Coumanis, with the support of the local DOP Thais Chapter, Penelope House continues to raise awareness for the prevention of domestic violence through education and public awareness. Executive Director/Sister Tonie Ann Coumanis Torrans and Sister/Dr. Coumanis, have provided decades of leadership and support along with the dedicated staff in the state's first domestic violence shelter. They were the 5th domestic violence shelter in the U.S.

I was honored to be able to visit the shelter in March of this year to tour the emergency shelter and see the good works they provide first hand. They maintain a 24-hour hotline, 365 days a year to provide counseling, intervention and referral services for those dealing with domestic violence. The shelter provides safety, food, clothing, advocacy services, case management, vocational counseling to get to work and provide themselves with a path forward on their own, along with children services. Other services include court advocacy, victim support groups, community education, prevention education, along with outreach services for those that may not need the shelter services, but benefit from how to deal with intimate partner violence. I was able to learn more about their Transitional Living Community that provide housing and supportive services for those that may be homeless, that will lead to more permanent housing. They also learn Life Skills to help them towards independence, such as home ownership, finances, budgeting education and parenting, to name a few. I also toured Penelope's Closet, away from the shelter, that provides clients with needed clothing and other items. I know many Sisters/chapters have made donations to this worthy endeavor. There are always good bargains to find and the public and community are very supportive of this outreach.

Another highlight was to participate in the Mobile Chocolate Festival held on March 18 that benefitted Penelope House. This annual event has many vendors that share their particular products, such as cupcakes, clothing, food trucks and a special area just for children to enjoy! I was honored to be a Chocolate Challenge Judge for all the creative chocolate dishes that were made, chocolate raspberry cake, brownies etc. It was a daunting task, but I was honored to taste all the goodies along with the other judges, and watched as the awardees earned their accolades! The local Thais DOP Chapter supported their Chocolate Martini Booth, along with their delicious baklava, and both were definitely favorites among the hundreds of visitors that supported this important fundraiser in the community! We even had some Sisters from Atlanta that had returned to volunteer in the booth, and after church on Sunday, we all enjoyed going out for lunch and reminiscing about all the fun we all had for such a worthy cause!

I want to thank GP Georgette for this opportunity to serve in this capacity for our DOP Sisterhood. "The Power of We" was very evident throughout my stay there. Special thanks to Sisters Kathryn, Tonie Ann, Sister Titsa Stratas (a long-time supporter of PH) for their gracious & warm southern hospitality in showing me all the wonders of Penelope House and Mobile!

National Chair Report Limbitless - Stella Sirks, PGG



"If you ask the kids... It was never about being able to pick things up."

"I was stuck in traffic and I'm listening to the radio and they had an interview with a gentleman who built the first 3D-printed mechanical hands ...

I came into my research lab and I said to everyone in my lab: I was like I have to be a part of this, I have to find a way ... Eight weeks later, [our first Bionic Kid] Alex got his first bionic arm.

I've always wanted to be able to use engineering for more than just inside the laboratory ... You hear about these kids who have no hope and then all of a sudden a little bit of teamwork and engineering gives these families hope.

This design was applicable to kids who have been a part of the limb difference community their whole lives due to birth defects or even survivors from accidents.

We thought that kids just wanted to blend in and that they wanted to feel normal, but it turns out it is much more about personal identity and expression.

What you do in your free time really matters; We go to school and then in those last few hours of availability in the day what you do can change the world."

- This is how it all began nine years ago. Since then Limbitless has given over 40 arms to children. Currently they provide and distribute bionic arms through clinical trials. A clinical trial is a research study through hospitals that has specific evaluations designed. Each study may be unique and may be conducted for months or years.
- Just because a child receives an arm doesnt mean they get it and go home. Learning how to use EMG (electromyograghic) technology to preform multi-gesture functions can be can be challenging. It is hard to determine thresholds of muscle strength without seeing a visual represtation and understanding the correlation. So..the challenge inspired Limbitless to create video games and accessibility controllers to assit their bionic kids as they learn the mechanics of their new arm.
- As if this is not enough, they have also introduced Project Xavier. This centers around a
 powered wheelchair attachment designed for individuals with mobility limitations, such as
 ALS patients or quadriplegics. They use EMG sensors placed on the face temporals muscles
 to control a powered wheelchair. This will open doors to a new population of people with
 limited or no mobility.

Several of you had the opportunity to visit Limbitless Solutions headquarters at the University of Central Florida during last years National Convention. To see first hand what these young adults have created and continue to create, at no cost to the famlies, is both remarkable and rewarding. I know that you were all inspired and impacted on what you saw and heard. I am SO proud of our Sisters for supporting and spreading awareness and helping empower these children who have historically been discouraged in society and have lacked self confidence." The power of WE" has made a difference!!!

My sincere thank you to Grand President Georgette Boulegeris for once again offering me the privilege of chairing the innovated, empowering, life changing organization, allowing children to live life without limits.

National Chair Report LAM Foundation - Thespena Panos



Hello Sisters.

Can you say, "Lymphangioleiomyomatosis"? I never heard this word before, much less could pronounce it, until I was diagnosed with this disease in 2017. Lymphangioleiomyomatosis, also known as LAM, is a rare, progressive lung disease striking about 5 in a million women in the prime of their lives. LAM occurs almost exclusively in women, which is why it is so fitting to have The LAM Foundation as a DOP Mandatory National Project. I would like to thank our Grand President, Georgette Boulegaris, for giving me the opportunity to chair this project and share my personal story.

I was shocked to hear how many DOP members had familiarity with this rare disease. Surprisingly, The LAM Foundation was a National Project about 20 years ago when another Greek woman was diagnosed with LAM. The Florida chapters rallied around this young lady and raised awareness and funds for The LAM Foundation to help in its efforts to find a cure. The DOP chapters across the country truly made a difference in supporting The LAM Foundation in its early stages of research.

While there is no cure for LAM, living with the disease is much different today than in years past. LAM research has come a long way and has led to some amazing breakthroughs, including in 2015 the first FDA-approved effective treatment to try and halt the progression of the disease. The LAM Foundation plays an instrumental role in advocating and providing information to patients living with LAM including support, education, resources, clinical trials, treatment options, and the latest medical research. There are 70 US & International Lam Clinics with specialized physicians and researchers fighting for a cure.

I was honored to be a guest speaker at the National LAMposium Conference last September in Chicago. This three-day conference, hosted by The LAM Foundation, consisted of patients and their family members, doctors, researchers, and scientists from all over the world. I spoke to a large audience on the importance of fundraising, raising awareness, and how the Daughters of Penelope were supporting this effort. Discussing the DOP National Project inspired listeners to reach out to their local organizations to provide a better understanding of LAM and ask for their support. In October, I spoke at our District's Fall Conference in Plymouth, IN. It was nice to share my story with not only the DOP, but AHEPANS as well. From there, our local DOP chapter, Pleiades #50, Hammond, IN, held a fundraiser featuring Comedian Gus Constantellis. Over \$6,000 was raised that evening specifically to go toward our National Project to support The LAM Foundation.

Early detection is so important and that is why raising awareness is crucial. It took 7 years for me to finally be diagnosed. The hardest part is knowing that if I had been diagnosed earlier, I would not require oxygen today. The LAM Foundation is truly my saving grace. I went from deep despair to renewed hope and determination to live life to the fullest. This is why advocating for The LAM Foundation is so important to me. Thank you to all of the Daughter's of Penelope chapters across the world for supporting this mission. Your generosity and support provides women with LAM a fighting chance and continued hope that research scientists will one day find a cure. 1. Description of Business and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Organization

The Daughters of Penelope was founded in 1929 for the purpose of helping women of Hellenic descent, and wives and families of the early immigrants, to assimilate into the North American way of life in order to become productive citizens of the United States and Canada.

The Daughters of Penelope Foundation, Inc. (the "Foundation") incorporated under the laws of the District of Columbia in 1983, was established in a contemporary effort to further enhance those goals by addressing the concerns and issues that face the changing role of women today. Current programs include scholarships, symposiums, motivational speaking events, and a multi-faceted literacy project. The mission of the literacy project is to promote reading books for young and old alike, to educate through literature, to celebrate authors of Hellenic descent, to build community relations, and to donate books to local libraries, schools, hospitals, and shelters. The funding for a literacy scholarship has also been created through this project.

Basis of Accounting

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting which is in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP). Financial statement presentation follows GAAP for not-for-profit organizations.

Net Asset Classification

Net assets, revenues, expenses, gains and losses are classified based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions. Accordingly, net assets and the changes therein are classified as follows:

Net assets without donor restrictions - Net assets and contributions not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. This category also includes net assets designated by the Board of Directors for specific purposes.

Net assets with donor restrictions - Net assets and contributions that the donor restricts for specific purposes such as the awarding of scholarships or grants, or to be maintained into perpetuity are included in this category.

This category includes net assets and contributions subject to donor-imposed stipulations that may or will be met by actions of the Foundation and/or the passage of time. After donor-imposed time or purpose restriction is satisfied, these net assets are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported within the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

This category also includes net assets and contributions subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be maintained permanently by the Foundation. Generally, the donors of these assets permit the Foundation to use all or part of the income earned on related investments for general or specific purposes.

Revenue Recognition

Revenues are reported when received or pledged as increases in net assets without donor restrictions, unless the use of revenue is restricted by donor-imposed stipulations.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers all highly liquid investment instruments with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Investments

In accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, investments have been recorded at fair market value as of March 31, 2023 and 2022. Fair value is determined by readily determined current market values for equity and debt securities. Donated securities are recorded at fair value at the date of gift. All realized and unrealized gains and losses and income or loss arising from investments are accounted for in the statements of activities as increases and decreases to net assets without donor restrictions unless they are restricted by a donor imposed stipulation.

The Foundation adopted the fair value measurements and disclosures required by current accounting standards. The major categories of financial assets must be measured at fair value using quoted prices in active markets (Level 1), significant observable inputs for similar assets (Level 2), and significant unobservable inputs (Level 3). The investments at March 31, 2023 and 2022 were considered Level 1 investments. The fair value of investments is disclosed in Note 3.

Investment income includes interest, dividends, and capital gain distributions. Realized gains/losses result from sale of investments. Unrealized gains/losses represent change in the market value of investment assets.

Contributions

Contributions, including unconditional promises to give in future periods, are recognized as revenue in the period received. Conditional promises to give, which depend upon specified future and uncertain events, are recognized as revenue when the conditions upon which they depend are substantially met.

Contributions received with donor-imposed stipulations that are met in the same year as the contribution is received are reported as revenues in the net assets without donor restrictions.

The Foundation uses the allowance method to determine uncollectible unconditional promises receivable. The allowance is based on prior years' experience and the Foundation's analysis of specific promises made.

Advertising Expenses

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable represent funds collected by the Grand Lodge of the Daughters of Penelope ("Headquarters") on behalf of the Foundation, which are paid over to the Foundation after the end of the fiscal year. These amounts are net of the 15% charged by Headquarters. The gross amounts collected by Headquarters totaled \$10,911 and \$11,749 as of March 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively. The amounts withheld by Headquarters totaled \$1,637 and \$1,762 as of March 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively. The net amount is the accounts receivable of \$9,274 and \$9,987 as of March 31, 2023 and 2022, respectively. Management has determined that no allowance for uncollectable amounts is necessary as of March 31, 2023 and 2022.

Donated Services

The Foundation receives a significant amount of donated services from unpaid volunteers. No amounts have been recognized in the statements of activities because the criteria for recognition under accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America have not been satisfied.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires the Foundation's management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results may differ from such estimates and such differences could be material.

Concentration of Credit Risk

Concentration of credit risk generally results from cash and accounts receivable balances. The Organization places its cash with high credit qualified financial institutions and, by policy, limits the amount of credit exposure to any one financial institution. Historically, the Foundation has not experienced any losses on its cash.

Functional Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statements of activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services based upon estimates made by the Foundation's management and various internal records.

2. Pledge Receivable

Pledge receivable consists of the remaining balance due for a donor restricted stock donation to fund a future perpetual scholarship. The dividends from the donated stock are being applied to the receivable balance each year. The pledge receivable is not discounted to present value due to the immateriality of the discount amount.

3. Investments

Investment cost and fair value is presented as reported by the brokerage firm and, in general, is exposed to various risks such as interest rate, credit and market risks. Due to the level of risks associated with such investment securities, it is reasonably possible that changes in the valuation of investment securities will occur in the near term and that such change could materially affect the amounts reported in the statements of financial position.

4. Board Designated Net Assets and Donations

Included in net assets without donor restrictions are amounts designated for specific purposes by the Board of Directors. The Board designated net assets, described below, indicating the different reasoning behind Board action to set aside funds.

The Board has designated funds to fulfill and supplement all permanent scholarships received before 2007 to the minimum agreed, at that time, necessary to provide income for continuance of the scholarship awards.

An additional Board designation relates to the Anyte Literacy Scholarship. The Board had been designating amounts from the accumulation of earnings from book sales, less applicable associated costs to fund this scholarship. In 2018 the Board voted to fully fund the Literacy Scholarship endowment with Board designated net assets.

As detailed in Note 5, the total Board designated net assets to supplement the permanent scholarship endowments prior to 2007 and the Anyte Literacy Scholarship endowment totaled \$104,300 as of the years ended March 31, 2023 and 2022.

The Board also designates net assets to supplement annual scholarships to round them up to \$1,000 increments or offer additional annual scholarships when funds are available.

The Board has designated \$1,000, as available, to Chapters and Districts as an incentive to build a bridge between the Daughters of Penelope and the communities in which they live via projects promoting community service and family excellence. Actual grants awarded will be dependent on the qualifying applications; up to four \$250 grants for qualified programs/projects may be approved by the Board.

5. Scholarship Endowments

Net assets and contributions subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they may be maintained permanently by the Foundation are considered net assets with donor restrictions. Contributions were received from donors with the donor-imposed stipulation of perpetual scholarships.

In fiscal year March 31, 2017, a campaign was started to set up a new perpetual scholarship, Pay It Forward, to encourage past scholarship recipients to create a fund to support a perpetual scholarship. As of March 31, 2023 and 2022 \$4,120 has been donated to this fund.

6. Annual Scholarships

Contributions subject to donor-imposed stipulations that they be used to award annual scholarships are considered net assets with donor restrictions. Headquarters collects chapter contributions for scholarships and remits them to the Foundation after the May 15th scholarship application deadline so they are awarded for the fall semester of the following year. In addition, contributions were received from donors with the stipulation that they be used to award named scholarships. Since they are received prior to the end of the fiscal year they are awarded for the upcoming fall semester.

The amounts with donor restrictions for annual scholarships as of March 31, 2023 include chapter contributions of \$5,895 to be awarded for the fall of 2024, chapter contributions of \$6,222 to be awarded for the fall of 2023 and \$3,000 from donors awarded for the fall semester of 2023 for a total of \$15,117 as detailed below.

The amounts with donor restrictions for annual scholarships as of March 31, 2022 include chapter contributions of \$6,222 to be awarded for the fall of 2023, chapter contributions of \$6,099 awarded for the fall of 2022 and \$4,000 from donors awarded for the fall semester of 2022 for a total of \$16,321 as detailed below.

7. Income Taxes

The Foundation is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. As such, its normal activities do not result in any income tax liability.

The Foundation's "Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax – Form 990" tax returns are subject to examination by the Internal Revenue Service, generally for three years after they were filed.

8. Endowment Fund Policies

The Foundation has various endowment funds with donor imposed or board designated restrictions on investment and expenditures from the said funds. The Foundation has an investment management company, Wells Fargo Advisors as of March 31, 2023 and 2022, which assists with the management of the investments.

Interpretation of Law: The Uniform Prudent Management Institution Funds Act requires the preservation of the fair value of the original gift as of the gift date, unless a contradictory donor request states otherwise. The Foundation classifies the original value of gifts donated as net assets with donor restrictions.

Investment Return Objectives and Risk Parameters: The Foundation is committed to preserving the amounts received for donors and the board designated funds as a base, while growing the funds of the Foundation through appreciation. With this policy in mind, assets are invested to keep pace with inflation while intending to grow the value of the assets, less any fees.

Spending Policy: The Foundation drafts and approves a budget each year. Operating expenses are kept to a minimum through the member's voluntary contribution of time and talents. The budget reflects keeping with the purpose of the Foundation and their charitable activities.

9. Liquidity and Availability

The Foundation receives gifts to establish endowments that will exist in perpetuity and the income generated from such endowments is used to fund the perpetual scholarships. In addition, the Foundation receives annual support that is used to fund the annual scholarships.

National Project Report LAM Foundation By Ronni Berke, Director of Development & Communication



To our friends at the Daughters of Penelope:

With generous support from women with LAM, donors, volunteers, scientists, clinicians, and the broader LAM community, The LAM Foundation continued to pursue new milestones in 2022. The hallmark of 2022 was the return of our in-person International LAM Research Conference & LAMposium after four years. This seminal event was life-changing for patients and families, energizing for LAM scientists and clinicians, and rejuvenating for donors, staff, and volunteers dedicated to our mission.

The Foundation remains committed to a breadth of programs for our entire community, including outreach for those who cannot travel, yet who are actively engaged with our online educational activities and support groups. Below is how we have and will continue to direct the funds we raise to three critical mission programs – patient and family support, access to expert clinical care closer to home, and funding promising LAM research:

Research Costs – Expenses of \$933,242– grants of \$431,511

The LAM Foundation awarded \$410,000 to fund five new research projects in 2022. The International LAM Research Conference presented the latest innovations in LAM science, with 102 leading-edge scientists, early career researchers, and clinicians. A research poster reception at the Conference exhibited 39 posters. The LAM Foundation Early Career Network (TEN) was established as an independent platform for young investigators to discuss their LAM research and career goals.

Patient Services - Expenses of \$482,215

In collaboration with our LAM clinic directors, liaisons and scientists we offered 25 virtual events, including LAMposium in Your Living Room webinars, education meetings, and social gatherings. More than 820 members of our global community attended our virtual events, and the recorded presentation received over 880 viewings, further spreading LAM education and awareness around the globe. More than 225 individuals registered with the Foundation: 150 + from the United States and more than 70 from other countries. This year, six Circle of Hope Transplant Support Program participants provided nearly a dozen tissue samples to further LAM research. More than 200 women with LAM, family, and friends attended LAMposium, with 60% attending their first LAMposium.

Clinical - Expenses of \$105,468

The LAM Clinic & Research Network continues to expand and provide locally based, expert care for women with LAM around the world. We added 4 clinics in 2022: University of North Carolina; Yale University; Aahus University, and Rigshospitalet, Denmark. More than 38 Clinic Directors and staff took part in the first Clinic Director Congress in four years, focusing on challenging cases, clinical practice guidelines, and priorities for LAM clinical care and diagnostic methods. In partnership with five Worldwide LAM Patient Coalition members and the CHEST Foundation, we have translated the LAM Clinical Practice Guidelines infographic into Portuguese, French, Spanish, Swedish, and Hindi.

Notes to Financial Statements

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of The LAM Foundation (the Foundation) is presented to assist in understanding the Foundation's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Foundation's management who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity.

Nature of Operations

The Foundation is an Ohio non-profit entity incorporated in 1995 urgently seeking safe and effective treatments and ultimately a cure for Lymphangioleiomyomatosis (LAM). LAM is a progressive and frequently fatal lung disease that affects primarily women. The Foundation believes its goals will be achieved through patient advocacy, the funding of promising research and advancement of clinical expertise in the treatment of LAM through a global network of LAM clinics. The Foundation is dedicated to serving the scientific, medical and patient communities by offering information, resources and a worldwide network of hope and support. The Foundation is governed by a Board of Trustees and obtains significant funding from contributions and fundraising activities.

Basis of Presentation

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Foundation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions, which are available for use in general operations and not subject to donor restrictions; and net assets with donor restrictions which are either temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor, or are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Foundation considers all liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents. At December 31, 2022 and 2021, cash equivalents consisted primarily of money market deposit accounts and certificates of deposits. The Foundation maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, exceed federally insured limits. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk.

Pledges and Accounts Receivable

Pledges and accounts receivable are due from various donors and the general public. An allowance for bad debts is reported when necessary to provide for estimated uncollectible accounts. The Foundation has not experienced any significant losses on its receivables and believes it is not exposed to significant credit risk on its receivables. As of December 31, 2022 and 2021, management considers all pledges and accounts receivable collectable, thus, no allowance is recorded.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Property and Equipment

Property and equipment are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition or at estimated fair value at date of gift, if donated. The Foundation's policy is to capitalize asset purchases that exceed \$500. Depreciation is provided on the straight-line basis over the estimated useful lives of the assets, which range from three to six years.

When assets are retired or otherwise disposed of, the cost and related accumulated depreciation and amortization are removed from the accounts, and any resulting gain or loss is recognized in income or expense for the period. The cost of maintenance and repairs is expensed as incurred while significant improvements are capitalized.

Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are recorded at cost at the date of acquisition and amortized over their estimated useful lives. The Foundation's policy is to capitalize intangible asset purchases that exceed \$500. As of December 31, 2022 and 2021, the Foundation had \$6,531 in trademarks with the United States, Europe and Canada. Amortization expense for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 was \$271 each year. Accumulated amortization as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 was \$6,332 and \$6,061, respectively.

Contributions

The Foundation records gifts of cash and other assets at their estimated fair value as of the date of contribution. Such donations are recorded as support without donor restrictions unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the assets are to be used. A gift that is originally restricted by the donor for which the restriction is met in the same year that the gift is received is recorded as revenue without donor restrictions.

Gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as support with donor restrictions. Absent explicit donor stipulations about how long these long-lived assets must be maintained, the Foundation reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired long-lived assets are placed in service.

Unconditional promises to give expected to be collected within one year are reported at their net realizable value. Unconditional gifts expected to be collected in future years are reported at the present value of estimated cash flows. The resulting discount is amortized and reported as contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are recognized as revenues when the conditions on which they depend are substantially met.

Contributed Services

The Foundation records contributed services as revenues in the period received only when the services rendered create or enhance non-financial assets or require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically be purchased if not provided by donation. Additionally, not included in the accompanying financial statements is the value of a substantial number of volunteers (including Board members) that have donated significant amounts of time for programming and fundraising activities.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Leases

The Foundation determines if an arrangement is a lease at inception. Operating leases are included in operating lease right-of-use (ROU) assets and operating lease liabilities on the statement of financial position. The operating lease ROU asset and operating lease liabilities are recognized as the present value of the future minimum lease payments over the lease term at commencement date. As most leases do not provide an implicit rate, the Foundation uses the risk-free rate at the commencement date of the leases in determining the present value of future payments. The operating ROU asset also is adjusted for any lease payments made and excludes lease incentives and initial direct costs incurred. The Foundation's lease terms may include options to extend or terminate the lease at certain dates, typically at the Foundation's discretion. Lease expense for minimum lease payments is recognized on a straight-line basis over the term of the arrangement.

The Foundation made an accounting policy election that payments under agreements with an initial term of 12 months or less will not be included on the statement of financial position but will be recognized in the statements of activities on a straight-line basis over the term of the agreement.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of supporting the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services. Such allocations are determined by management on an equitable basis. The most significant allocations were salaries and other employee costs which were allocated based upon estimates of time and effort spent by the Foundation's personnel on each functional area. Other expenses are charged based on specific identification when feasible or are otherwise allocated using rational and reasonable cost allocation methodologies.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with United States generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, as well as the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Income Tax Status

The Foundation is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and a similar provision of Ohio law. However, the Foundation is subject to federal income tax on any unrelated business taxable income.

The Foundation's IRS Form 990 is subject to review and examination by federal and state authorities. The Foundation believes it has appropriate support for any tax positions taken, and therefore, does not have any uncertain income tax positions that are material to the financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements (Continued)

NOTE 1 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Effect of Adopting New Accounting Standards

In February 2016, the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) issued Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 842, *Leases* to increase transparency and comparability among organizations by requiring the recognition of right-of-use (ROU) assets and lease liabilities on the balance sheet. Most prominent among the changes in the standard is the recognition of ROU assets and lease liabilities by lessees for those leases classified as operating leases. Under the standard, disclosures are required to meet the objective of enabling users of financial statements to assess the amount, timing, and uncertainty of cash flows arising from leases. The Organization adopted the standard effective January 1, 2022. The standard did not result in a material change to the financial statements.

In September 2020, the FASB issued Accounting Standard Update (ASU) 2020-07, *Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Presentation and Disclosure by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets* to increase transparency of contributed nonfinancial assets through enhancements to presentation and disclosure. These include separate presentation in the statement of activities, disaggregation by type, policy and qualitative information about monetization and utilization, description of valuation techniques and inputs used to arrive at a fair value measure, and donor-imposed restrictions associated with the contributed nonfinancial assets. The Organization adopted the standard effective January 1, 2022, applied retrospectively.

Subsequent Events

In preparing its financial statements, the Foundation has evaluated events subsequent to the statement of financial position date through June 7, 2023, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY

The Foundation strives to maintain liquid assets sufficient to cover six months of general expenditures. Financial assets in excess of daily cash requirements and grant funding are invested in certificates of deposit and money market funds.

The following table reflects the Foundation's financial assets as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, reduced by amounts that are not available to meet general expenditures within one year of the statement of financial position date because of contractual restrictions or internal board designations. Amounts not available include board designated net assets that are intended to fund special board initiatives related to research and not considered in the annual operating budget. In the event the need arises to utilize the board designated funds for liquidity purposes, the reserves could be drawn upon through board resolution. Amounts not available to meet general expenditures within one year also may include net assets with donor restrictions. Net assets with donor restrictions were \$288,055 and \$335,593 at December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

NOTE 5 FUNDS HELD FOR OTHERS

The Foundation has an agreement with Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center (CCHMC) to administer the Rare Lung Disease Consortium (RLDC) and the multi-site clinical studies conducted within the RLDC. The grant includes funds awarded to the Foundation for administrative support and funds to be passed through to the approved clinical research institutions as directed by the study chairs. Funds held for others, and to be passed through to the approved clinical research institutions, included in the statement of financial position as of December 31, 2022 and 2021 were \$23,322 and \$28,787, respectively.

NOTE 6 RESEARCH GRANTS PAYABLE

The Foundation provides six grant award types: Career Development Awards, Established Investigator Awards, Pilot Project Awards, Designated Awards, Special Project Awards and Bridge Funding Awards. Career Development Awards provide support for postdoctoral research fellows who are starting their research careers and are working in the laboratories of established researchers or conducting research with the mentorship of established researchers. Established Investigator Awards provide a maximum of three years of salary support for a technician. Pilot Project Awards provide seed monies to pursue new research directions. A Designated Award supports work in which fundraisers and donors work with the Foundation to support specific research projects or awareness programs, chosen from a slate of pre-peer reviewed and Board approved proposals. Special Project Awards fund projects that do not fall into one of the above three categories and Bridge Funding Awards provide interim funding until anticipated funding from other sources is awarded.

The Foundation has the right to withdraw or modify the amount awarded based on review of each project's results. Project results are reviewed at least annually. Therefore, the Foundation accrues a payable for the approved award payments for the succeeding 12 months with the remainder representing a contingent liability. Grants payable were \$233,568 and \$255,000 at December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

The additional, yet contingent amounts were approximately \$610,432 and \$665,500 at December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively. The Foundation's Board of Directors has, however, designated these amounts of its net assets without donor restrictions for the funding of these contingent fellowships.

NOTE 7 RETIREMENT PLAN

The Foundation established a simple IRA plan covering substantially all employees. Employees may contribute a portion of their compensation not to exceed the maximum allowed by the Internal Revenue Service. The Foundation contributed a total of \$14,774 and \$13,426 in 2022 and 2021 respectively, to the plan.

LAM research and consultation services consist of professional services provided by a Scientific Director. As the Scientific Director does not track his hours donated to the Foundation, the Foundation values his services based on an estimated fair value of \$3,500 per month. In 2021, the Foundation also received professional services to support MIDAS research from a Clinical Trial Consultant. The Foundation valued this at an hourly rate provided by the Clinical Trial Consultant of \$53 for 26 hours of donated time. The Foundation uses these professional services for research purposes and all donated services are without donor restrictions.

NOTE 11 LEASES

The Foundation leases office space under a short-term operating lease that is set to expire on May 31, 2023. Short-term lease expense for this lease included in occupancy costs for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021 was \$31,254 and \$31,017, respectively.

NOTE 12 COMMITMENTS

During 2019, the Foundation made a commitment to the University of Cincinnati Foundation and the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine to establish The LAM Foundation Endowed Chair for LAM Research ("Endowed Chair"). During 2020, the Endowed Chair was established to support the work of an associate professor of clinical medicine who may also serve as a resource for advice, advocacy and leadership at the Foundation.

In February 2022, the Foundation's Board of Directors voted to formalize a prior commitment to fund an additional \$200,000 to the Endowed Chair.



Limbitless was named the **2022 .ORG Impact Award** in the **Health and Healing** Category. Limbitless will receive a \$10,000 donation to support their groundbreaking work. The .ORG Impact Awards, which are in their fourth year and hosted by the **Public Interest Registry**, the nonprofit that operates the .ORG Family of Domains, were created to honor and celebrate outstanding mission-driven organizations and individuals working to make the world a better place. In total, 947 organizations and individuals submitted entries this year from more than 68 countries across seven award categories, including Community Building, Environmental Stewardship, Health and Healing, and more.





Launching ENGAGE: K-12 STEAM Educational programs

The educational outreach team at Limbitless Solutions was thrilled to kickoff new field trip experiences for K-12 students. This *educational program*, named *ENGAGE*, provides hands-on exposure to science, technology, engineering, art, and math through activities focused around the concepts used in Limbitless' bionic technology. Senior students in the *DiMino Engineering & Technology Program at the King's Academy* took their first field trip to the facility, amplifying their *Project Lead the Way* coursework.

The team also reprised their role at the **Florida Department** of **Education's Sunshine Scholar Symposium** to engage and inspire Florida's top STEM 11th grade students. This year was particularly special for Limbitless, as two of its scholars represented the organization – **Katie Esker** (UCF Interdisciplinary major) and **Om Vishanagra** (UCF Biomedical Sciences and Mechanical Engineering Dual Degree). **Vishanagra** was a 2021 Florida Sunshine Scholar and now part of Limbitless' research team.

Oregon Health Science University clinical trial completes three year study

Limbitless completed the final study visit of the first bionic arm clinical trial with *Oregon Health and Science University* in September, 2022. The research study was the first of its kind, evaluating the unique 3D printed bionic arms in a national study. Now the focus will be on completing the analysis of the work so that Limbitless can improve future bionic kids' experiences with the device.

The OHSU medical team and Limbitless team spent several days at the Limbitless facility testing the effectiveness of the arms through clinical assessments performed on the bionic kids and their arms. This experience would not be possible for our bionic families without the support from the OHSU team.





Orlando Health Study launches for first patient cohort

The program was excited to launch the new clinical trial with *Orlando Health*, welcoming new patients on site this spring. This was the first of several patient cohorts to be welcomed into the program. For the first phase of the trial, participants will gain an understanding of how to activate the bionic arm's multi-gesture controls by using Limbitless' training mobile phone video game, *Limbitless Runner*, with a custom muscle sensing controller. The game helps prepare the participants to use their electromyographic (EMG) bionic arm at the two-month evaluation mark.



Scholars Program: Celebrating largest graduating class and student success

This spring, Limbitless' largest graduating class of students walked the stage and became alumni of the **University of Central Florida**. These undergraduate students represent a wide array of UCF majors within different Limbitless teams ranging from engineering to public relations. **The Limbitless Scholars program**, the organization's student internship program, continued its growth this fiscal year, reaching 48 students in the Fall of 2022 and 52 students in the Spring of 2023.

Limbitless Research scholars presented six research posters at this year's **Student Scholar Symposium** at the University of Central Florida (UCF), one of which received a Judges Choice Award. Research and Finishing team scholars **Kelsey Robinson** (majoring in statistics) and **Viviana Rivera** (majoring in biomedical sciences with a minor in studio art) received a Judges Choice Award for their presentation on "Art in Pediatric Prosthetic Limbs: Methods and Creative Design." Their poster explained the painting process behind Limbitless' bionic arm sleeves. It analyzed the production and artistic decisions that could lower prosthetic rejection rates and improve a child's satisfaction with their prosthetic.

Graduate *Emily Peterson* and rising senior scholar *Calvin MacDonald* presented their research poster, "Improving Mobility Independence for Patients with ALS by Applying Electromyographic Control Schemes and Gamified Training," during a poster session at the [medical conference] *Northeast Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (NEALS) Consortium Meeting* in Clearwater, FL. The meeting brought ALS researchers from across the country to discuss clinical trials, projects, and updates in the ALS community.

Making strides in research: Published work in multiple journals & conferences, advancing future technology

Limbitless is moving forward with its patented handsfree wheelchair technology. The technology allows patients with limited mobility to use their facial muscles to control their wheelchairs. The research results were recently published in *the Journal of NeuroEngineering and Rehabilitation*. Limbitless Solutions has been collaborating with *Mayo Clinic* to evaluate the technology's readiness since 2019.

A key component to the next phase of the work is improving training for the patients to learn how to operate the hands-free technology. The team's game design students and faculty have been developing a training game that enables practicing the driving commands in a low-stress virtual environment. Recent developments were published at the 2022 Symposium on Eye Tracking Research and Applications hosted by the Association for Computing Machinery. UCF's associate professors Matt Dombrowski '05, '08 MFA at UCF's School of Visual Arts & Design and Peter Smith '05, '12 PhD UCF's Nicholson School of Communication and Media have been creating video games for gamified training to support children learning to control Limbitless' bionic arms and bionic wheelchairs.

National Project Report Penelope House By Executive Director Tonie Ann Coumanis Torrans

In many nonprofit agencies, staff wear several different hats. In 2022, I added the temporary hat of "owner" as Executive Director during the comprehensive shelter expansion project that was funded by the CARES Act. Throughout 2022, while the shelter remained open, meetings began with selecting an architect firm and then selecting a construction company; once they were in place and plans were finalized and approved, construction began in April- to expand the shelter to provide additional offices, meeting rooms, and client rooms. The expansion was in response to how shelter operations have changed in response to COVID-19 and will allow Penelope House to better serve those in shelter whether it's the flu season or another highly contagious illness.

In 2022, Penelope House sheltered 258 adults and 340 children; received 1,746 crisis calls; served 18,380 meals; attended 6,710 court appointments with clients; assisted clients receive 1,206 Protection from Abuse or No Contact Orders; and reached 18,801 individuals in the School Based Prevention Education Program. It was a remarkably busy year- yet all services were provided during major construction at the shelter and while all COVID protocols continued-comprehensive cleaning, social distancing, wearing masks, eating in shifts or in client rooms, and sheltering one family unit per room.

It certainly takes an entire team/village for dreams to come true at Penelope House- whether it's simply providing an awesome Christmas for those in shelter to helping a client move into our Transitional Living Program to the largest construction project I have ever been a part of! Penelope House is very appreciative of our "village" that includes many generous Daughters of Penelope Chapters and individual Sisters. As Cinderella said, "A dream is a wish you heart makes..." – keep the faith as dreams do come true!

National Project Report Penelopean Day Care Center By Veronica Tsalta, Karyatides Chapter President

The Penelopean Day Care Center, is still struggling to overcome the economic problems involved in the maintenance of the building. However, it continues to be in good operational status. In the school year 2022–2023 the Penelopean serviced 130 children aged from 5 months to 4 years old, giving help to needy mothers and families or unemployed parents with low or no income.

With the children temporarily absent during the month of August, we had some construction work going on in the building.

The Local Authority Inspection Committee, congratulated again this year, the Board of Directors of the Penelopean for their excellent work. Also, they suggested improvements that will need to be done in the building, so that the children live in a safe and healthy environment. Together with the Daughters of Penelope donations, we were able to do considerable improvements, concerning the plumbing and drainage systems of the building.

This year we were able to

- replace the old falling apart dividing door of the Art Lessons Hall. Its dimensions are 7,5 ft x $_{21,6}$ ft = $_{162}$ sq. ft. and the total cost was 3,600 Euros
- replace the old decaying backyard metallic gate. The total cost was 4,800 Euros

Please note that all prices include a VAT of 24%, according to the Greek law. Since the Penelopean Daycare is a Philanthropic Foundation, all donations to it are exempt from Greek taxes.

National Project Report Penelopean Day Care Center By Veronica Tsalta, Karyatides Chapter President

What we need to do next:

- There are two emergency exit doors on the ground floor, that we created a couple of years ago. Now we need to develop the outside space of the yard with escape ramps. The existing patio with stares is not safe for the children in case of an emergency. The cost is estimated to 2,000 Euros.
- We need to create emergency-exit facilities on the 1st floor, where the babies stay and sleep, perhaps with establishing an outdoor elevator, independent of electricity outage. The cost is initially estimated to 4,000 Euros.
- In the yard of the Daycare, there is a 52,5 sq. ft. construction made of 'asbestos materials. It is imperative that we replace it, since asbestos is extremely dangerous for the health of the children and the personnel of the Penelopean. The cost is estimated to 5,000 Euros.
- Changing the central heating from oil to gas is postponed, as, for the time being, the transition to gas is not considered more beneficiary, due to the energy crisis.

The cost for ANY maintenance and upkeep of the building depends entirely on donations. We are thankful to all those who help us, especially our Daughters of Penelope Sisters. Your kind donations are of tremendous help to these costly but necessary projects!

As you can see, we still have a lot to do with the maintenance of this old but very useful building. Your donations have been and will be valuable in joining our efforts to keep the Penelopean Day Care Center going and servicing needy mothers and their children. We thank you so much!

Next year, we hope that we will be able to shelter more children and do our best to keep them happy and smiling.

Penelope's Place: A Community of Strength and New Beginnings

Penelope's Place is a five-bedroom home where women and children who are in extreme danger go to save and rebuild their lives.

Unfortunately, it is one of only 26 emergency domestic violence shelters in Massachusetts, and the only one in Brockton, a city with some of the highest rates of poverty, violence, and poor health outcomes in the state.

Every night in Massachusetts, 3 out of every 4 families who call for emergency shelter are turned away for lack of space. It is getting worse.

In order to help as many people as well as possible, the Daughters of Penelope and Health Imperatives developed an extraordinary partnership fifteen years ago. We transformed the way we help people help themselves. We provide what women and children need to be physically, emotionally, and economically secure. And the results speak for themselves. Before our partnership, people stayed for more than a year on average. Today, the average stay is a little over three months before the vast majority secure permanent affordable housing. As a result, we can serve four times as many families.

We are now building on our successes to open Sanctuary Place, a comprehensive supportive housing program for victims of sex trafficking in the Fall. These models are not only innovative, they are life changing.

For example, a mother was referred to us from a Boston hospital where she was treated after being horrifically abused by her husband. Her five-year-old son witnessed the violence and from that moment on stopped speaking. They were both in shock. Our staff provided the emotional support and physical safety they needed to begin to heal. Within two weeks the boy was speaking and enrolled in school, and the mother went to counseling, received legal services, took English for Speakers of Other Languages, financial education classes, and began to look for housing and employment. Within three months, they secured a permanent affordable housing voucher they could use anywhere. They chose an apartment close to Penelope's Place, where the boy can continue to thrive in school, and they can both stay close to the staff who they now consider family.

Thanks to your generosity, we have been able to help 52 women and children this year find safety, strength, peace, and hope. We are committed to doing all we can to reach as many people as possible whose lives are in danger. Your continued support can make all the difference.

Joan Vennochi's column <u>"Ana Walshe story — another missing white woman dominates the news"</u> (Opinion, Jan. 12) highlights how unconscious racial and socioeconomic biases cause uneven reporting of homicides and missing persons cases.

There can never be enough reporting on violent acts against women. The extensive coverage of Ana Walshe's story advanced the investigation into her disappearance. The horror of her situation is on everyone's mind.

That is not the case for <u>Amber Buckner</u>, <u>who was murdered in Stoughton last month</u>. Coverage described her apparent substance use disorder, residence in a halfway house, children in the care of others, and that she was "getting her life back." This focus inadvertently fuels victim-blaming. Including these details diminishes her humanity and our horror.

At our organization, which works with victims and survivors of domestic violence, we know that this feeling of horror can lead to positive change. Most people want to help their neighbors. They need to know there is a problem and what to do. But too many women are too ashamed to come forward.

Greater awareness of unspeakable crimes leads to positive change. We must feel equal horror, regardless of the victim's circumstance, and work as a community to prevent violence from happening in the first place.
